Keally McBride on the Progressive Era

Associate Professor of Politics and International Studies at the University of San Francisco and Visiting Scholar, Department of Rhetoric, UC Berkeley; author of *Collective Dreams: Political Imagination and Community*

The "New" Political Landscape of California

Moderator: Rachel Brahinsky

Larry Gerston, Department of Political Science, San Jose State University

Professor Gerston will discuss his most recent book *Not So Golden After All: The Rise and Fall of California* on the growing dysfunction of California's political and economic system. He will reflect on how 21st Century California government operates on a 20th Century model, particularly in terms of taxing and spending capabilities and the state's rapidly changing demography.

Rubén Martinez, Fletcher Jones Chair in Literature and Writing, Loyola Marymount University
Ruben will present New Centers, New Peripheries: Addressing the radical demographic movement spurred by the boom of the 2000s and the aftermath in the crash years. He will discuss how gentrification was a kind of internal migration in the wake of the historic influx of immigrants from Asia and Latin America, examining how nominally all stakeholders share a center-left ideological position, but their class interests diverge.

Sharing geography and building commuity with art and technology

Patricia Wakida, Los Angeles Atlas Project. Patricia will give a presentation about the process of creating the *Los Angeles Atlas*, an upcoming, ambitious book of original essays and maps that will allow readers to conceptually experience Los Angeles in new and highly imaginative ways, to be published by Heyday Books.

Chris Carlsson, Shaping San Francisco. Chris will show slides from the FoundSF archive and talk about their site, explaining how it uses "interactive multimedia" and mediawiki technologies as new art forms to present a complicated, multilayered, nonlinear urban history.

Darin Jensen, UC Berkeley Geography department cartographer. Darin will show "Mission Possible: A Neighborhood Atlas" and "Food: An Atlas" to discuss the map as a narrative device that fuses traditional cartography, poster art, infographics, and journalistic text blocking. He will also discuss the concept of collaborative knowledge-caching as a model for data-collection and content sourcing.
